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PICKENS — Efforts by Pickens County to improve air quality have gained the state's attention as the Department of Health and Environmental Control announced this week the county has been included among four recipients of its 2010 "Spare the Air Award."

environmental stewardship, exercise positive environmental practices and promote environmental awareness.

Pickens County won for "Outstanding Local Government," with DHEC citing the county's efforts in converting used cooking oil from restaurants and schools into biodiesel fuel that powers a number of county-owned and operated vehicles. This marks the first year that Pickens County has received the award, which has existed since 2008.

Pickens County Administrator Chap Hurst said the county is pleased to be the recipient of such a prestigious award.
