Downtown Go'Round features Recession Proof

SENECA — To prove the recession doesn't stop the arts, Blue Ridge Arts Council will present its 21st annual juried show tonight with more than 90 artists featured and highlighting their creativity during an economic recession.

BRAC Executive
Director Lisa Kiser said
93 artists from South
Carolina, North Carolina
and Georgia entered
the juried show, which
Kiser said is the largest
turnout of entrants from
every artistic medium.

"This is one of our highest, prestigious shows," Kiser said.

Brian Lang, of the Columbia Museum of Art, judged the show, and Kiser said it took more than 3 hours to make his selections for the "Recession Proof" exhibit.

"We were blown away at the quality of work we received," Kiser said.

Entries for the exhibit opened in October, and artists could submit work completed in the last two years.

"We feel (Brian Lang) did an excellent job choosing **the artwork,"** Kiser said.

"Recession Proof" features 80 pieces, and 49 others will be placed in The Salon, which will also be on display in the studio and collection space at BRAC.

"This show brings a large group of artists that we don't normally get," Kiser said.
