## Oconee airport fence would shield newly extended runway from wildlife

SENECA — Now that the conee County Regional Airort has completed extending a runway to 5,000 feet, it is eady to get started on a new roject.

Next on the airport's capital nprovement schedule is the istallation of an 8-foot fence to rotect the runway from pranc-

ig wildlife.

Two protected Wildlife lanagement Areas bordering to airport expose the airfield dashing deer that officials ty is a significant hazard to reraft taking off and landing tring darkness.

Airport Director Kevin Shortsaid the fence would run north and east around the newly extended runway to completely enclose the airfield.

The total cost of putting up 9,400 linear feet of fencing is \$350,385, with the Federal Aviation Administration paying 95 percent.

Oconee County and the South Carolina Aeronautics Commission will split the remaining 5 percent cost of \$17,518.

The Oconee County Council this week voted unanimously to accept the grant money from the FAA and from the state to move forward with the project.

"We are finally getting action toward alleviating our wildlife issues, or at least having a significant deterrent to this," Short told council this week.

In accepting federal and state funds for the project, council also approved a Memorandum of Agreement with the Division of Aeronautics, which will undertake the administration of the project. A Division of Aeronautics engineer will design the project.

Short said the county's participation would include advertising and taking bids on the project.

Short toured the project site with Division of Aeronautics staff on Thursday.

Once the project gets under way in the fall. Short said it

would take about 90 to 120 days to complete.

In the meantime, the airport is putting the word out on websites frequently used by pilots to let them know that Oconee's extended 5,000-foot runway is completed.

The longer runway, extended at a cost of about \$4.8 million, allows for larger aircraft to use the strip, and is expected to help generate additional revenues.

The airport also is in the process of building eight new Thangars. When completed, the county is expected to lease the new hangars for \$250 a month.
