

Duke, county officials to test sirens around nuclear station

SENECA — Duke Energy and county officials will test the public sirens around the Oconee Nuclear Station in October, according to a news release provided by Duke Energy spokeswoman Mikayla Kreuzberger.

No public action is required. The full-cycle test of the 65 sirens within 10 miles of the station around 11:50 a.m. on Oct. 11 will last three minutes "to assure each siren works properly," the news release said. Duke Energy performs the test with Oconee and Pickens counties every three months.

County emergency officials are responsible for sounding the sirens.
