Seneca, Uconce exploring options for Clemson annexation

SENECA — Seneca city officials and Oconee County officials each met behind closed doors in separate sessions. I uesday night to discuss their options a day after the Clemson planning commission voted to recommend approval of a plan to annex property inside Oconee County.

Seneca City Council held an executive session to discuss the Clemson annexation for more

In an email response to The Journal on Wednesday Mudge declined to specifically address the concerns of the two councils.

When they came back into public session, Alexander said no formal action was taken, but read a statement that previewed possible future action by the

"Before the city goes further formal action will be required to be taken," Alexander said.
"We will work with the county

revenue, but also lose the rural nature of this county, a feature that contributed greatly to my decision to relocate here. This has been a hot topic among residents, and everyone I've spoken to disapproves of the annexation."

Councilmen Julian
Davis and Paul Cain attended Monday's meeting of the Clemson planning commission along with Alexander "to listen," and both also met with Alexander and Seneca city administrator Greg Dietterick on Monday.

"My largest concern is allowing another city of another county into your county," Davis said. "One of the words that was used nine times in the city plan ning commission—and I counted—was landlocked. To me, it's kind of a desperation. I feel like Clemson is reaching and this is the last point they can reach to in order to grow."

Cain said he was concerned to learn at the

In Walhalla, the county council's Budget, Finance and Administration Committee—which includes all five council members — added an executive session to its agenda to discuss "an economic development matter related to Lakeside Lodge." The council met behind closed doors for more than 30 minutes before returning. Council chairwoman Edda Cammick said no action was taken and none was necessary.

Lakeside Lodge Clemson is a planned \$40 million-plus condo-

minium development slated to have 118 condos. Steve Mudge, one of the developers for the project, has requested annexation into the city of Clemson. That request was approved by the planning commission this week and will go to Clemson City Council on Monday for a public hearing and the first of two readings of the ordinance before the annexation can be approved.

Oconee County administrator Scott Moulder said recently the proposed annexation would cost the county about \$100,000

a year in accommodations tax revenue and would also allow Clemson to move its city limits into Oconee County for the first time. He added that the move could allow the city to move deeper into Oconee County in the future with contiguous annexations. During Monday's meeting, Clemson city officials said the request fit its comprehensive plan, which says in part that the most viable way for the city to grow is by annexing west into Oconee County.
