They were excited to come up here and are really enjoying it." Fulmer and her family are among a number of campers who chose to spend their Labor Day weekend at Oconee County parks. Although many campers could be seen leaving the parks Monday morning, South Cove County Park superintendent Stephen Schutt said the end of the holiday weekend doesn't mean the end of camping season.

"Next weekend, we're full again," Schutt said. "We have a big summer season where we've always seen a good season, but now we're seeing good crowds in the spring and fall season we had not seen prior to going to a reservation system."

Schutt added the amount of traffic can extend as late as November.

"We get a lot of football traffic now that we haven't had before," he said.
