Monthly programs, special cultural celebrations and seasonal education are all on the spring list at the garden, and education program coordinator Allison Jones is excited to see a few of this year's events make a comeback.

Family Science Saturday and Step into the Past are on the same day during the same time, she said, giving families an opportunity to learn something new at the nature center and experience a true blast from the past at the Hunt Cabin.

Both events used to be called open houses, she said, and have a drop-in setup with different exhibits and craft stations.


Things that Leap will be set up in the nature center on Feb. 29 and Brr .... Bear Stew is the focus at the Hunt Cabin.

"She's using that as a theme to jump off, so it could be rabbits or frogs or any other critter that hops or jumps," Jones said. "There may be some exhibits that are really focused on little kids and others aimed more at families. It always varies."

As for the bear stew, her best guess is it's a title meant to speak to hearty hearth meals of the past. there won't be any bear stew to sample.

"Some of these book really far in advance," she said. "but we keep a really full calendar, so there's always something to look forward to."
