Construction numbers growing in Oconee despite pandemic

As of mid-May, Oconee ounty has already had ore residential building ermits issued this year an it did in all of 2019, asting past the 144 permits 735. Commercial permits re at nearly 80 percent of leir 2019 total, but have ipled in value.

through the planning office in the past three weeks, Chapman said.

About half of the houses are lake homes, he said, and the other half further from the water

on former farmlands.

"Other than the student housing complex in Hartwell Village that's already on the books, they're all single-family homes, not multi-family," Chapman said. "There's a lot of construction going on, and the most visible one is the student housing in Hartwell Village."

While the county waived permit fees for tornado-related damage, Oconee County has seen more than \$43,000 in fees for the 360 permits issued since April 13.

More than \$516,000 in permit fees — including electric work, tearing down outbuildings and relocating mobile homes — has been paid since Jan. 1.
