Keowee Key group has raised nearly \$400K for charities

SALEM—A private Salem community group is closing in on nearly \$400,000 in donations to local charities in Oconee County.

Keowee Key Community Partnership chairman
Jon Bachman told The
Journal last week the
group that works to help
nonprofit organizations
in the area has raised
more than \$345,000 from
September 2018 to September 2020. Bachman said he
is hoping donations will
exceed more than \$400,000
by the end of the quarter.

"I'm thrilled with it,"
he said. "I jokingly said
to the guys on my committee, 'Someday we
could reach half a million
dollars — wouldn't the
impact to Oconee County
be spectacular?" I believe
we'll exceed that next
year. It's beyond my expectations."

The group started two years ago to raise awareness between residents in the Keowee Key community and encourage them to focus on donating to charities in Oconee County. Bachman said Keowee' Key residents volunteer more than 100,000 hours a year to community service work in the area.

Bachman said the group

now many donors there are.

Some of the partners include BabyRead, Collins Children's Home, Fostering Faithfully, Golden Cor-

ner Food Pantry, Habitat for Humanity, Our Daily Bread, Our Daily Rest, Purple Heart Homes, Ripple of One and the Oconee Memorial Hospital Foundation.

"Everything we do is focused on Oconee County," Bachman said. "We will publicize them to our residents and encourage them to make donations. In return, they commit to use all the money they receive from Keowee Key exclusively in Oconee County."

The group's first partner

was Tri-County Technical College. Over time, the two have worked to establish a partnership with the Tri-County Technical

College

to create a
scholarship
fund that
recently
covered two
semesters
of study for
a nursing
student, An
endowment
fund is also

being worked on to eventually self-generate scholarship amounts. To date, the school has awarded six scholarships from the Keowee Key Community Partnership Scholarship Fund, with three of them being awarded to Keowee Key employees or family members of an employee.
