## 'New and fresh': Publix opens in Seneca

SENECA - An event that was years in the making brought Seneca city officials and locals together early Wednesday morning to welcome the new Publix Super Market to the area.

The grocery chain, which spent \$100,000 in May 2018 to purchase the lease, permits, licenses and fixtures for the former Bi-Lo building on Rochester Highway, opened its doors for

the first time at 7 a.m. Wednesday.

"Welcome Publix. We appreciate y'all," Seneca Mayor Dan Alexander said before the ribbon cutting. "We're glad to have you here. Most of all, we thank every customer that's here to help support this business. It's a great day in Seneca."

Alexander said Seneca store manager Ray Peters of Walhalla came to the area in 2003 and has spent 31 years with the compa-

son, looking forward to getting the Seneca Publix opened up and getting everybody exposed to what Publix is all about in our hometown," Peters said.

Publix media manager Jared Glover said the company is "more than just a grocery store."

"Publix believes in being a part of the community, investing in the community and the people that are a part of the Seneca community," he said. "We're excited to be here, excited to be good citizens of Seneca."

Glover added a feature of the new store is a second-floor dining area above the store.

The work to get to Wednesday's opening took a few years and included tearing down the former Bi-Lo building and building a new 48,000-squarefoot store, all while keeping the storefronts on either side intact. Building permits filed with the city of Seneca estimated the project cost at about \$7 million. Publix signed a 20-year
