Local residents and friends were lined up all along the parade route from Main Street to Ram Cat Alley to see the first homecoming parade downtown in seven years.

Colleen Vassey was waiting on the parade with her sons, 7-year-old Flynn and 4-year-old Rowan. Flynn was having fun, but said he was more excited about his soccer game after the parade. Rowan was excited to see the SHS band.

"I just have little ones and I thought it would be fun to see the band and to see the floats," Vassey said.

A little farther up the parade route, Northside Elementary teacher Michelle Duvall was enjoying time with friends and waiting to see her kids — a Seneca High senior and a freshman — in the parade.

"I came out to support my kids and just everybody else," she said. "I'm a Seneca graduate. I think it's wonderful that we're having the parade (downtown) again. The weather's beautiful, and we get to have it on Thursday night, so we get extra people that maybe wouldn't normally come to the parade because of

Jazz on the Alley. It's just a little bit of support for our hometown."

Brooke Davis, a former teacher now working at the school district office, was nearby with her two children.

"I have two kids that I want to expose to the magic of home-coming," she said, adding she was looking forward to "the floats, seeing students, seeing the band and the cheerleaders."

"I'm here because my daughter is in the cheerleaders in the parade, and we're here to cheer on the Bobcats tonight for homecoming," Barry Duvall said.

His friend Ron Gambrell joked that he was "looking for Santa Claus."

"He's coming last in the parade," Gambrell said.

Heather Vassey said she was at the parade to "support the school in our community."

Cheryl Cabanero agreed, adding, "We're really excited that they came to downtown Seneca. We're going to watch them and eat some dinner."

Denise Robinson said she was excited about "seeing the floats."

"I have a daughter that goes to Northside, and we're just supporting the Seneca community," she said.
