'Totally against it'

Elliott says he won't support 1,900 homes along Hwy 130



WALHALLA — Oconee County Councilman John Elliott said he will do everything in his power to withhold public money from paying for infrastructure for four proposed subdivisions totaling nearly 1,900 residential lots along the Keowee River.

Elliott's comments came in a Tuesday county council meeting, moments after Seneca resident Mike McAllister shared his thoughts on a Journal article from earlier this month breaking the news about the 746-acre project revealed in an Oconee

County officials are unaware of any existing sewer or water lines already in place at the development. And the decree of the

McAllister said his concern on the project focused on the stretch of future traffic on S.C. Highway 130 👝 🕬 (Rochester Highway) from Ingles up to Duke Energy's Oconee Nuclear 🤊

"There are people all over this country coming in here and building housing developments. It's they want to put it. Densityit's going to look like when you fly in over someplace in Los Angeles or someplace like that before it's over." he said. "You can't stop it."

The only publicly known require ment for the project is the South Carolina Department of Transportation (DOT) and Oconee requiring a traffic study be done ahêad ôf 🖫 construction. McAllister cálled on the developers to create their own access points on the backside of Old Clemson Highway.

Let them put in all the infrastruc ture," he said. "Let them do everything that they're wanting to but that would take money out of their pocket, right? You would have three access points on Highway 130 from these subdivisions, it's a bad idea."

said he was "totally against that four developments?

"Absolutely. Possibly 6,000 people accessing that 130. There's no way to make it four lanes, as you point out," he said. "The dikes are there, it's a done deal. There's some beautiful areas in Mountain Rest but you start out on 130 above Ingles and come up the Rochester



. Highway and those two dikes hoperuny you're not driving, but look out at the lake and these beautiful mountains and then you come up on the woods on both sides

"One side is where like not even quarter acre lofs. These are going to be cookie cutter houses. I am totally against it. I'm not sure how to stop it but I am not going to let taxpayers pay for any sewer going up there or any water lines going up there. If the develop er wants to do it, he's on his own.

PROPERTY DETAILS

Councilman Julian Davis said Keowee River Preservation Group LLC submitted plans when it acquired the land "15-16 years ago.''The land is now valued at \$6 million.
